

FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK




Happy May everyone! It is nice to see dancers back on the floor, especially the snow birds that have returned from the south.



This is the second in what we hope will be a series of informative columns from our Activity Leaders. We hope the readers see value and ask to see the presentations continue.

HOW TO BE A TEAM PLAYER:

When we step into a square to dance, each of us takes on the roll of a team player, in this group of eight dancers. What is your role and what can you do to assure and perhaps improve the dancing experience for all?

Following is a list of simple steps that, with a little effort on your part, will become dancer habits and improve the dancing experience for all. When joining a square, ask yourself the questions below:

- 1. Am I in a head or a side position? This is also referred to as 1&3 and 2&4.
- 2. Who is my partner? See, I told you this would be easy.
- 3. What is my couple number -1, 2, 3 or 4?
- 4. Am I dancing in the man or woman position? Often in today's dance world we take on different roles. If so, are others aware? Tags/badges do help.
- 5. Who is my corner? Opposite? Knowing who your corner is can be a big help, especially as they progressively sequence in a singing call figure.

Then, listen for the music to start and be prepared to act, as the first call may be for you.

Touching hands with adjacent dancers can help to affirm your current position.

The square "breathes" as we dance, so do what you can to keep it from losing definition or growing too large.

Generally speaking, do not extend your hands to the point that your elbows are more than four inches (10 cm) from your sides. DO NOT reach out, dance into the position or hand hold.

Keep the shoulders of the inside dancers in close proximity, especially during promenades, both on the inside and around the perimeter of the square.

Dance your part and be in your position, as this is often the best way to help others. Sometimes you can get great info by observing your position counterpart in the other squares.

When attempting to assist other dancers, DO NOT physically turn them unless they may be in danger of falling or being tripped, as usually the Leader will be watching the people and can offer assistance. An extended hand, a point or a quick whisper, often suffices. If you feel that more direction is required, ask the Caller to offer assistance, usually after the tip is ended.

In summary, the experienced dancers can and often do, provide a great environment for newer or less experienced dancers to grow. If you are a newer dancer, learn to evaluate your dancing experiences and measure your abilities. Follow the simple guidelines as listed above and allow yourself time to learn - from dancing, dancing, dancing, every place and every time you can. Once again, knowing your part, as a team player, is the best action you can take to improve the dancing experience for all. I strongly feel that most square breakdowns can be avoided. Read the Call list for the level you are dancing and self evaluate your abilities. Leave the rest to the leaders, as we are always here to help.

The results of a member survey conducted in early September showed the membership reluctantly had to concede that the club could not continue to operate. Chris has been calling square dances and cueing round dances for over 29 years! Congratulations Chris and Ruby on your retirement.!


Ruby and Chris will continue square and round dancing with the Sussex Corner Square Dance Club and keep supporting their local clubs.

Federation of Dance Clubs of New Brunswick, Inc. Directors and Year Started

Board of Directors General Bylaw – 6 – Number and Power

6.1 – Affairs of the Federation shall be managed by a board of eight directors who may exercise all powers and do all acts and things which may be exercised or done by the Federation and which are not by the Letters of Patent or bylaws of the Federation or by law expressly directed or required to be done by the Federation at any annual or special general meeting of the members.

General Bylaw – 10 – Term of Office

10.1 – The Director's term of office shall be for two years from the annual meeting at which he or she is elected or until his or her successor are elected. A person appointed by the director then in office shall hold office for the balance of the unexpired term of the board. A maximum of three consecutive terms may be served by any one director.



George Henwood



Some people may wonder who George Henwood is, they have heard the name and some may have seen him on the dance floor but do they really know who the real George Henwood is. Well those who are close to him know him and well and will tell you a little bit about who he is.

George Henwood has been a member of the dance activity as a whole for close to 65 years now. When asked a recent dance to stand and tell how long he has been dancing he rattles off a number and chuckles about his time on the dance floor. An original member of the Elm Tree Square and Round Dance Club, Charter Member of the Oromocto Pioneers, long time member of then the Capital City Rounders under the leadership of 3 different couples in his time, member of the Harvey Honeybears in his current home town and hard to say how many other clubs he danced with while being in the Army and travelled abroad.

George and his late wife Norma were at every dance they could be in their life together. George once recalled a time they were serving in the army living in Germany – we were as he used to call it a Jack of all trades & Master of None for the RCEME of the Canadian Military in his day. He and Norma was dancing with a club in the town they resided and had set up a dance by bus with members of the club to dance in 9 countries in one 24-hour span. George will tell you with a great chuckle in his voice that they almost made it – if it had not been for that one horse's ass of a border guard who would not let them through! George and Chick as he referred to Norma wouldn't let that bother them that was just a speed bump in the road.

George and Chick would be found at just about every dance there was around. The both of them had a passion for dancing that could be seen by all who watched them. Acting foolish was always part of the game when the two of them danced. As years went on and Norma suffered health issues their square dance time together was fewer and fewer but when the round dance come on they were there together smiling, gazing ever so loving into each others eyes as they twirled and swung to the music. A love for dance and for each other that not only was on the square dance floor but even at fiddle doo's as George refers to them. The two of them never left the floor dancing was their love of life beyond their love for each other.

George always used to say that when it was their time to go – it would probably be on the dance floor. For Norma that was a reality. While attending a Saturday night special at an Elm Tree Dance just having left the floor from dancing one of her most beloved round dances she had requested and was listening to the caller sing her favourite singing call When the Saints Go Marching In she quietly passed amongst the family that they both had been part for some time. A loss that was felt by many that evening.

George has never been one to break away from tradition. Even though losing his beloved chick he returned to dancing to find comfort in a life he had shared with his greatest love. He continues to dance today when it doesn't interrupt with his fiddle doo night of course.

George along with Norma like many held every position within the executive of most of the clubs they danced with over the years. Always willing to lend a hand whenever it is possible he is the first to step up.

As a friend of George and Norma's I have heard many a tale over the years. I recall when George was a member of the Don Messer Jubilee in it's hay day. George still pays tribute to Don Messer each year with the aiding in the organization of the Don Messer Dance held during Harvey Community Days and I believe he is also part organizer of the Church Service that takes place not too far away from the old homestead of Don Messer. The stories of when he travelled with the Islanders from show to show on his old motorcycle. He talked one night of him and old Charlie (Chamberlain) were travelling from one town heading to the next gig and he could feel this weight on his back. George being who he was thought nothing of it at the time till he turned around to see how old Charlie was only to find he had fell asleep right there on his back. George still chuckles as to how could one ever sleep through a trip like that – the roads weren't too smooth nor was the ride of his old motorcycle back then either!

George he remained active every day. He considers himself one of the last of the old timers of the original RCEME group here in Camp Gagetown. Still well respected like he was in his earlier day the group looks up to him for his guidance. George has been the organizer of the Remembrance Day Services at the old Camp Petersville cenotaph out in the middle of the training fields of Base Gagetown.

George is very busy within his community life as well. He is an active driver for those in the village who need to go to Fredericton or Saint John for Doctors Appointments or treatments, he is always the first one to his bi weekly fiddle doo in Upper Kingsclear helping set up the chairs and help the guys set up the sound system and putting chairs away each week. He can be found down at the local pewter shop at Atlantic Pewter helping the owners with pieces of their work or even could be found constructing one of his favourite pieces the railroad spike with full train and tracks on it. He could even be making some nifty square dance jewellery to sell periodically at a dance if you ever ask him so nicely.

George always has an open door policy at his place. The door is always open to visit whenever you want. The teapot is always ready to fill and a laugh or two to be had. Lord knows some may even know how to get into his house when he's not home he has returned home to some crowds of people having a good time. He will always tell you when in Harvey and you see the Charlie Little Road, swing in just look for the barn with the orange roof sit a spell and visit.

George is what square dancing is the life of the party, always willing to lend a hand even if you don't think you need it. The first to donate, the first to help, the first to joke and he might even convince you that you need to exchange money at the Nova Scotia border "cause we don't accept blue nose notes in NB"

We at Elm Tree are privileged to offer up one of the greatest friends to the activity we know it to be and know that in some way for many in the Fredericton Oromocto area know that he had a small part in shaping the activity into what it is today. There fore we feel that George Henwood is deserving of the Distinguished Service Award.

this one is unique. The couple, we are going to honour today, used to take evening walks. While walking they would pass by a house that had loads of good top soil in their yard. Now, this was of interest to this couple, because they needed some for their lawn. The wife wanted to go and knock on the door of this house, and ask the owners where they got the soil, but the husband, kept telling his wife **NO!**

One evening, the owners of the soil were out working in their yard, when the couple walked by, and the four of them struck up a conversation. Before, these people left to walk back home, they had agreed to be picked up by their new friends, to go and try square dancing. Now, the wife in this case, was not so sure about all of this—she certainly did not want to go in the back seat of someone dse car—because, if she did not like—this square dancing—she wanted to be able to leave and go home.

Well, they stayed at the dance, and ended up graduating in 1999 from the Bayswater Weavers/Fundy Wheelers. Now, we will fill you in on what they have been doing for the square dance world for the last 22 years.

Federation of Dance Clubs of New Brunswick, Inc (FDCNB)

Before long they became involved in N.B.'s first Convention, 2002. They acted as Chairpersons for the Banner Parade in Saint John, they made flags for all the Provinces and Countries in attendance, and he, designed the cover page of the 2002 Souvenir Booklet. They joined the Board of Directors of the FDCNB in 2003. 2021 marks their 16th year on the Board. They are currently the Convention 2022 Committee representatives to the Canadian Square and Round Dance Society (CSRDS). They have been NB Federation Reps to the CSRDS since 2010.

During, their first six years on the Board (2003–2009) many changes took place in the NB Federation. In 2004, they became the first provincial marketing committee. She developed a membership retention questionnaire that was completed by dancers throughout NB. She correlated the results in Power Point presentations for the Board that were shared with dancers throughout the province. As a result, he designed and mailed five thousand introductory dance flyers throughout the province. He, also designed business cards for every club to distribute to prospective dancers and mini brochures for places like doctor's offices and information booths. They worked with a graphic artist to develop the logo for FDCNB and prosed the slogan "Fun, Fitness and Friendship", both of which were adopted by the Federation Board of Directors. He held the position of Vice President for the final 2 years of their first six year term.

In 2005, when the Federation reviewed and relaxed its dress regulations based on the results of the dancer questionnaire, they visited every club in the Province to talk about and display the newly accepted Square Dance Attire.

He served as the first New Brunswick Webmaster; he designed the Web Page which was used for the 12 years he held the job. She served as Chair of the Bursary Committee since its inception in 2013 (8 years).

South-western NB Square and Round Dance Association (SWNBSRDA)

They joined the Board of the SWNBSRDA in 2005. He did on term as Secretary Treasurer and three terms as Association President. For the first six years of the Terry Fox Dance for cancer research, they volunteered with the Fundy Wheelers/Bayswater Weavers. For the next nine years, they did it under the SWNBSRDA, three of which were while he was President.

Canadian Square and Round Dance Society (CSRDS)

In 2010, they joined the CSRDS Board of Directors, he was elected Vice President, and she accepted the task of Editor of the CSRDS Directors' Manual.

In 2012, early in their second term, he assumed the duties of the Acting/Society President for a six month period. During this same period, he found it necessary to assume the duties of Membership and Insurance Chair, a position he held for the next four years. In late 2013, the Canadian Corporations Act dealing with Not-for-Profit Corporations was completely revamped. Consequently, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, and the CSRDS Directors' Manual had to be rewritten. He worked in cooperation with Bob Ru-ohoniemi, the Society President, on the By-Laws, Rules and Regulations. She completely rewrote the Directors' Manual. This complete refurbishment of all major documents was completed within a four month period.

In 2014, he became President of the CSRDS. He kept his Membership/Insurance portfolio and added that of Privacy Officer. She remained as Editor of the Directors' Manual and assumed the additional duties of Director for By-Laws and Regulations. In 2016, and again in 2018 he was re-elected as President of the CSRDS. They both continued with their portfolios.

In 2020, at the beginning of their sixth term on the Board, he became Past President of the CSRDS. Some changes were made in tasks. He became Chair of the Nominations Committee and Co-Chair, with her, of the Directors' Manual. She retained the By-Laws, and Rules and Regulations Portfolios.

During his tenure as CSRDS President, he represented Canadian dancers as an invited panellist of the ARTS Organization in Spring-field. Ma.

They have presented numerous Certificates of Recognition for Club Anniversaries and Wedding Anniversaries throughout New Brunswick.

Where they danced:

During the past 22 years, they have danced in every club in NB, PE and many clubs in NS. They have danced in most of Canada and Eastern United States. They have attended:

17 Maritime Callers and Cuers Conventions; Six Canadian National Conventions; Four New England Conventions; One USA Convention; All of the new Maritime Camporees;

Many Provincial Festivals and Jamborees in Canada and the USA; and innumerable local festivals, special dances and anniversaries. As you can see, this couple has certainly done their part for the square dancing activity. They have attended dances at all local clubs, travelled extensively promoting dancing wherever they went. They have also, promoted fun at the after parties, such as a "Screech In" to make many dancers "Honorary Newfoundlanders". Another fun thing was at a Camporee, they showed dancers how to make and play an Ugly Stick.

We are sure that by now, you know this couple we are honouring, is Eric and Dianne McCormack.


